
Modelling Article

It's good to get ideas from members (in this case Richard Barton) and this is one worth taking a look at, its cheap and will do a great job concerning large constructions that can cost a large amount of money. You can use this idea to do most things on your garden railway from walls for railway cuttings, tunnel mouths, bridge supports, and anything you may think to create. First, which you may find strange are the materials we are going to use. They are the following

1. Polystyrene (easy to get hold of, packaging or even by purchasing)



- 2. Plywood or any wood that can stand up to our English weather conditions hot, cold and wet.
- 3. Best to use Masonry paint and purchase the small test pots, which will be fine and will also water proof the Polystyrene and plywood base board or you could try acrylic paint



4. The usual items screws and glues (Evo-Stik Multi-purpose silicone) that can deal with the above.



With Polystyrene it is important to use the silicone as a fixing medium to your wooden base board as most glues will make the Polystyrene melt (At this stage you may think Polystyrene really? However if applied correctly it will last forever as it does not degrade and is a waste product that is hard to dispose of)

5. Normal tools and have a look online or on eBay for a hot wire foam cutter to cut and make the shapes you require in the polystyrene.



Using the hot foam cutter enables you to cut and make shapes as can be seen below:





The images above also show the hot wire engraving tool used to shape the stone or brick look and the finished item painted.

The example below is for a single tunnel mouth.

Cut out the shape of the tunnel mouth in weatherproof plywood, ensuring that the mouth is to gauge and that your trains and rolling stock pass through with space to spare. Cut out your polystyrene to fully cover the wooden tunnel mouth and, glue with the silicone and wait for this to set. When set using the hot wire cutter cut around the wooden shape cutting away the excess polystyrene to give you the tunnel mouth opening and supporting wall. Then using the engraving tool melt the shapes of stone or bricks and then paint to finish. If you are making more than one tunnel mouth, use the first wooden base as a template to mark out the others before installing the polystyrene.






In the photo above you can see the polystyrene tunnel mouth painted in grey stone and with a red brick surround around the mouth and in the back ground top left is a supporting wall again using the polystyrene again to create the appearance of a stone supporting wall.

This method can be used for anything you might like to recreate: the appearance of stone, brick or even wood. The engraving tool is easy to use and with minimum practice you will be surprised what you can achieve.

Richard has created a great layout with lots of train movements and items to look at. There are buildings, tunnels, train sheds, sidings and running along the length of the garden fence. The back fence has a rack railway section that is connected to the main area as shown above. Richard has the Z21 digital control scheme and all the control equipment is located in a weatherproof box in a position where you can see most of the layout which gives the opportunity to shunt trains to and from the main two running loops.
